Alexx & Michael's Pond	West 132 nd Avenue and Zuni Street	<p>October 2000 - Two Centennial Elementary School students, Alexx Spademan and Michael Otto, passed away from rare childhood illnesses.</p> <p>The pond and nature area is a large natural preserve at West 132nd Avenue and Zuni Street, just a few blocks east of Centennial Elementary School.</p>
Jim Clapper Field	Broomfield Industrial Park	February 2009 - Jim Clapper, a long-time Broomfield resident, is one of the men that started and administered the Lions Club youth baseball program for nearly 37 years. Mr. Clapper passed away in 2015.
Colorado Rockies Field of Dreams	Northwest ball field at Broomfield Industrial Park	June 2005 - In 2003, this field was completed and named for a former Colorado Rockies player, who had contributed funds toward the field's development. In May 2005, per a recommendation of the Colorado Rockies franchise, the field was renamed "Colorado Rockies Field of Dreams" by City Council.
Anne Crouse Park	136 th Avenue and Kohl Street	May 2013 - Anne Crouse became a resident of Broomfield in 1958 and dedicated her time to many causes that supported and promoted the City of Broomfield and its residents, including serving on the Broomfield City Council from 1993 to 1997.
Paul Derda Recreation Center	13201 Lowell Blvd.	August 2002 - Paul Derda, known as "Mr. Broomfield," served as Recreation Services Director for Broomfield from 1979 to 2002. Paul can often be seen as emcee for many local events, including the Broomfield Days parade.
George Di Ciero City and County Building	1 DesCombes Dr.	August 2011 - Mr. Di Ciero served as City Manager for 43 years, retiring in 2011. Broomfield grew from a small municipality of approximately 6,000 people living in an area of 1.5 square miles to a thriving community of 55,000 citizens living in an area of 33 square miles under his leadership.
John Ferraro Gymnasium	Paul Derda Recreation Center, 13201 Lowell Blvd.	August 2011 - John Ferraro was the Director of Recreation Services and is credited with starting the youth recreational basketball league. John served as the golf coach and later an assistant coach at Broomfield High School.

Matthew Glasser Reservoir	Storage reservoir at Water Treatment Plant at 4495 W. 144 th Ave.	April 1997 - Former City Attorney Matthew Glasser served as the project coordinator for the Water Management Program for Area Communities from December 1990 to May 1993. This project involved replacing or protecting the drinking water supplies of Broomfield, Northglenn, Thornton, and Westminster from possible contamination by the Rocky Flats facility.
George Hall Field	Community Park	George Hall, Ward 1 City Councilman until 1968, was also one of Broomfield baseball's founding fathers. In October 1957, he and a group of Broomfield Lions Club members formed the Old Timer's baseball association. This was Broomfield's first little league program, and over the years, it has introduced thousands of kids ages 5-15 to baseball. The field was officially dedicated to him in 1974.
Bill Hosey Field	Community Park	Mr. Hosey was one of Broomfield Baseball's founding fathers who helped develop the Old Timer's baseball association in 1957 for kids 5-15 years of age. Bill Hosey Field was officially dedicated in 1994.
Josh's Pond	Just west of 11 th Avenue and Oak Circle in the Lac Amora subdivision	October 1992 - Named for Josh Cassell, who died at 10 years of age in 1991. Josh played at the pond with his neighborhood friends and Kohl Elementary School classmates.
Killebrew Playground	Northmoor Park	Mary Lamson Killebrew moved to Broomfield in 1968. She passed away in 1985, and the playground was built in her memory based on her love for children and commitment to the community, as evident by her hours of volunteer work at Bal Swan School.
Al Lange Field	Broomfield Industrial Park	May 2013 - Al Lange has served the citizens of Broomfield for nearly 30 years as a dedicated member of the Broomfield Lions Club and was at the epicenter of the Old Timers Baseball program serving as Director of Baseball and developing youth baseball in Broomfield.

Frank Marchi Field	Baseball field in Country Estates Park, Aspen Street and Durango Avenue	March 2000 - The late Frank Marchi, a long-time Broomfield resident, was involved with the Lion's Club and its youth baseball program for over 16 years. He helped start the Lion's Club Baseball Scholarship Program.
Joseph R. Mazzola Sensory Playground	Midway Park North	May 2015 - Mr. Mazzola was a long-time resident of Broomfield and dedicated his time to many causes that supported and promoted the City of Broomfield and its residents, including serving on City Council from 1961 to 1963. Mr. Mazzola passed away in 2014.
Ellie's (McKinley) Pond	700 East 10 th Ave. (formerly 10 th Avenue Pond)	July 2015 - Ellie McKinley dedicates her time to many causes that support and promote open space, trails, wildlife, and education for the Broomfield community.
David Milliman Field	Midway Park South	1964 - David was a young person that died in a shooting accident in his early teens. David's father, Don, served on City Council (1961-63).
Tyler Morrison Dugout	Al Lange Field, Broomfield Industrial Park	March 2015 - Tyler Morrison, a 7th grade student at Broomfield Heights Middle School and avid baseball player, lost his battle with cancer in May 2014. Tyler played baseball in the Thunder Baseball League, often times at the field with his memorial dugout.
Bob Prince Gymnastics Center	Paul Derda Recreation Center, 13201 Lowell Blvd.	August 2011 - Bob Prince served as the Director of Recreation Services and developed a gymnastics program that now serves over 1,000 participants. He has also served as the head gymnastics coach at Broomfield High School and led the team to a state championship in 1988.
Kelsey Shannon Bridge	Bridge at 137 th and Lowell Boulevard	2009 - Ms. Shannon was a local teen that went missing in October 2008. Her body was found near the bridge in January 2010.

John Shaw Field	Community Park	Mr. Shaw was a Broomfield realtor, who settled in Broomfield Heights in 1956. He was a member of City Council from 1963 to 1973, and was active in the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce, as well as other civic organizations. He volunteered on the original Broomfield Days committee and passed away in 1975.
Norman Smith Service Center	3001 West 124 th Ave.	October 1995 - Mr. Smith retired from City Council in 1995 after serving for 22 years.
Spader Way	North-south street, formerly Lamar Street, between 1st Avenue and Midway Boulevard	January 2014 - Mr. Spader's direct public service to Broomfield spans 22 years. He was originally elected to the City Council in 1973, and then elected as Mayor in 1975, serving in that capacity for 12 years - the longest of any Broomfield Mayor. He was elected again to City Council in 2003 and served until 2011, when he stepped down due to term limitations.
Richard Steele Park	Hoyt Street between the Lac Amora area and Broomfield Industrial Park	October 1997 - Mr. Steele was a Broomfield resident and co-inventor of the Duette Shades manufactured at the Hunter-Douglas Window Fashions Division in Broomfield. The park was named to honor the request of Hunter-Douglas Corporation's senior management.
George Stratton Field	Community Park	Mr. Stratton was one of Broomfield Baseball's founding fathers who helped develop the Old Timer's baseball association in 1957 for kids 5-15 years of age. George Stratton Field was officially dedicated in 1994.
Victor C. Thomas Field	Broomfield Industrial Park	August 1998 - Mr. Thomas was a Broomfield resident for 25 years and very active in youth sports.
